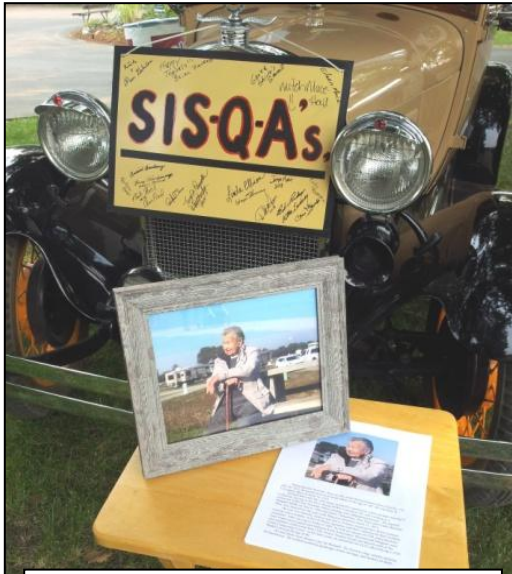

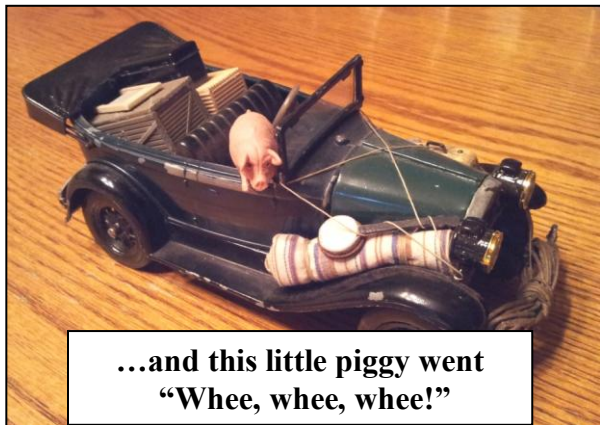

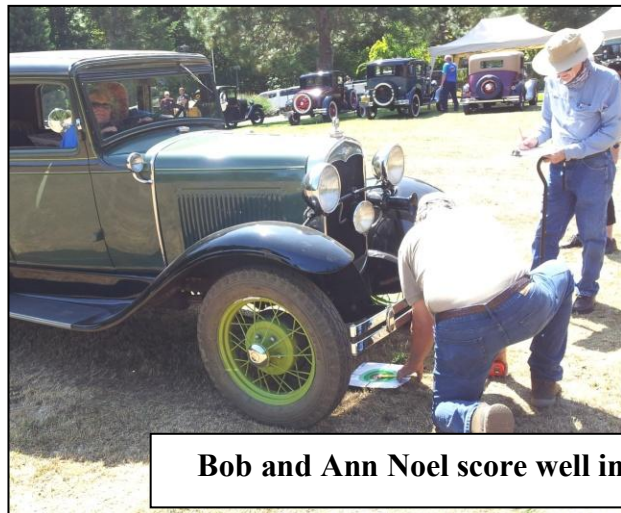
Rich and Pam Gabrielson make the rounds of the car games in the old rusty, trusty '28 double A.
